From our minister:

Dear Friends

It's been a hot July, for the most part. A modest heatwave up here in Edinburgh. In the south of England, the temperature has been savage over a long period. Throughout Europe, the heat has been intense and at record levels. Three weeks ago, Copenhagen recorded its hottest temperature since records began in 1874 – the Danes were basking in a sauna-like 37 degrees centigrade (that's 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit). I say "basking" but Scandinavians are not used to such heat and most were finding it distinctly uncomfortable.

Climate change deniers write all this off, and also refuse to acknowledge that measures need to be taken to combat the increase in global temperature. What do they care if rivers dry up and communities in African villages have lost their source of safe drinking water? Or if their crops are ruined by the heat? What do climate change deniers care if floods destroy houses, land and produce – as long as they are OK?

Oxfam explain how climate change results in more intense rainfall and increases the chances of flooding. "Global warming means the air can hold more moisture (for every 1°C of warming, the atmosphere can hold 7% more moisture). Climate change also makes connecting extreme weather events more likely. For example, stronger heat and dry conditions result in parched soils. Parched soils increase the risk of flash flooding when it rains. On top of how heavy and how much rainfall there is, other factors play a role. These include soil moisture, seasonal snow cover, infrastructure and land use. Not long ago, Pakistan bore witness to extreme floods. Over *30 million* people were estimated to have been affected. And there were over £10 billion in damages.

Extraordinarily heavy monsoon rains and melting glaciers contributed strongly to this. The floods hit just months after Pakistan saw sweltering temperatures of over 50°C.”

The climate change deniers and their powerful allies turn their eyes away. There is money to be made in the short term, and the effect on the world in a few decades is irrelevant to them, as is the plight of people already affected in the poorest parts of the world. They abuse the world for their own profit and if facts show that what they are doing is wrong, they called it ‘fake news’ and spread lies in its place. The war the USA is conducting against Iran is a case in point:

“If you combine us [the USA] and Venezuela, we have about 62% of the world's oil market. So, we don't need straits, we don't need anything. We don't need the Hormuz Strait, but we do it because we have to do it.” – *Donald Trump, 22nd July, 2026*

Actually, the USA produces about 22% of the world's oil (Venezuela less than 1%), so this figure of 62% is nonsense and completely fake (like most of Trump's figures - he just plucks any number that sounds good out of the air.). However, the Strait of Hormuz being closed will drive up the global price of oil and petrol, and therefore also the price of energy like gas and electricity (and anything that needs transported i.e. most things, including food) for consumers, which Trump either doesn't realise or doesn't care about.

It's no accident that oil and gas companies, arms traders, and global banks, have made huge profits in the last few months – while prices have risen for ordinary people all over the world. Oil giant BP more than doubled its profits in the first three months of this year! Donald Trump's personal wealth is soaring – by more than \$2.2 billion in the last 12 months...

I think of the words of the prophet Isaiah:

“Those who guide this people mislead them,
and those who are guided are led astray...
Surely wickedness burns like a fire;
it consumes briars and thorns,
it sets the forest thickets ablaze,
so that it rolls upward in a column of smoke.
(Isaiah 9: 16, 18)

We can't stop the disastrous war against Iran or suddenly halt climate change. But we can inform ourselves and change people's opinions, which are often held without knowledge of the facts. And that can lead both to changes of behaviour to combat global warming, and to communal activism to stand against the exploitation of the earth and its people by those without empathy or conscience. “Store not for yourselves treasures on Earth...”, says Jesus, but instead store up treasures in heaven. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” (Matthew 6: 19-21). “Treasures in heaven” are eternal spiritual rewards, good works, and a right relationship with God. Jesus contrasts these with fragile earthly wealth (which decays or gets stolen) by urging people to invest their time, resources, and love into activity that secures lasting value and aligns one's heart with God.

Oasis of Peace is on a break over summer. It will resume again in September. The date will be confirmed in church and the weekly news nearer the time.

Leith and Restalrig Church – Kirk Session

I hope you enjoyed the wonderful summer weather in July, though the keen gardeners amongst you may have been lamenting the lack of rain. By now, I am guessing we will be back to our more usual weather patterns. For those of you who managed to get away for a few days/weeks, I sincerely hope you had a restful holiday. Whilst this is traditionally a quieter time of year for church business, work has continued apace.

Items agreed or discussed at the Session Meeting in June, and in some cases, thereafter, include:

- Advertising for a second Minister – our Interim Moderator, Rev Lourens de Jager has been invited to attend the Session Meeting in August to oversee discussion and voting on the issue of departing from the Church's practice in relation to human sexuality in order for applications to be considered from, amongst others, individuals who are in same sex civil partnership or a same sex marriage.
- The Congregational Action Plan is almost complete as part of the Vacancy process.
- Refurbishment of Leith Walk building - the team working on this presented a draft Business Plan for this. A wide range of views were expressed. It was decided to bring this to the second Elders' Conference for further discussion and elders were asked to give their individual views/suggestions by the end of June.
- The Pilrig Street manse has now been sold and proceeds of the sale have now been received (minus 15% which goes to the General Trustees).
- The surveys carried out on the roofs of LARCH Restalrig, LARCH Leith Walk and McLaren Halls highlighted repairs totalling £38,000 and will be carried out in due course.
- A contractor was appointed to redecorate all three halls, the toilets and the entrance hallway at McLaren Halls. This work is due to start on 1 September and will last around three weeks.

- Fire risk assessments were carried out in all LARCH church buildings and halls and updated guidance will be issued regarding evacuation procedures in due course.
- Not long after the Session Meeting we were informed of a major roof fire at St Margaret Apartments. Whilst neither the old office nor the flat we rent out was directly affected, we cannot access either property until the roof has been made safe.
- Leith St Andrew's Trust has applied for funding in order to purchase the Leith St Andrew's building and should hear by November if they are successful.
- It was reported that the response to the Personal Information Update appeal had been disappointing overall with barely a quarter of the forms returned. It was agreed to take this matter to the Pastoral Care Team to decide next steps. Please see the article in this magazine regarding this and make every effort to complete and return a form, even if you think we already have all your details or if your details have never changed.
- The Ministry Team are intending to organise an Arts Festival for September with follow-up events in October and November. The theme is to be 'Community and the Environment' and would include visual arts, drama, music, film, poetry and dance. The festival would be aimed at different age groups and people would be encouraged to use their different skills and talents. Look out for more details in the weeks to come.
- The monthly services held on Wednesday evenings at Leith Walk have evolved into more of a drop-in session where people can chat, enjoy a cuppa or simply sit in silence. There is also a short activity/worship station each month for those seeking something more. Everyone is warmly welcomed to attend.
- The second Elders' Conference was held in early June. Please see the article about this on page 14.

Second Elders' Conference

This was held on Saturday 6 June. Our OLM, Nikki Kirkland, briefly outlined the purpose of the conference. She read the story of 'The Good Samaritan' and asked people to focus on how three key figures felt: the priest, the Levite and the innkeeper. How do we respond, and why, when we encounter people in need? How do we harbour prejudice as a church? Responses included:

- Uncertainty – is the person genuine? How will they respond when offered help? Are we doing the right thing?
- Fear – for safety
- Importance of acknowledging the person even if we cannot provide what they ask for.

There was a brief review of some of the key points from the last conference where it was agreed the theme of loneliness was a key issue facing our community. Some further responses included:

- People living near the LW building are interested in what is to happen to it.
- We need to encourage all members of LARCH to be mindful of the Leith Walk building.
- We need to expand on existing groups and activities e.g. Foodbank, Open Doorway and get more volunteers.

The responses from the congregation on what we can do to address loneliness within our community, both as a church and individually, were discussed. There was a clear difference between what members thought the church should be doing compared with what people could do individually. It was important to acknowledge and address this disconnect. The responses as individuals were, by and large, focused internally within the church itself. Many of the responses involved keeping in regular touch with members.

Dreaming Big

Elders were then asked to go beyond what is realistically possible, ignoring any concerns regarding finance, personnel, church law, planning rules, etc.

Ideas included:

- A complete change in society mindset to ensure that everyone was valued and had all the things required to enjoy a happy and fulfilling life.
- LARCH would have buildings, both current and future (such as smaller hubs) which were fit for purpose to serve the needs of the parish.

Redevelopment of Leith Walk building (LW)

- There are currently lots of things happening at Restalrig.
- LW – some things are happening, such as Foodbank, Open Doorway, hall rentals but lots more could be happening.
- Our 2nd minister will be focused on LW.
- There will be money from the sale of the Pilrig Manse and Leith St Andrew's.
- How can we make it better and more fit for the needs of our community?
- Sanctuary – people who come in are impressed with the building. How do we reach out to many more? There are three options:
 - Keep things as they are. The 2nd minister works round what we have at present.
 - Wait and see how things develop then perhaps redevelop. However, there is concern that any possible redevelopment will be too late, as any future Presbytery plans may then not see a use for the building.
 - Reimagine the building and make it fit for the 21st Century. The aim is to develop a vibrant Christian community, not just a building.
- A Development Team was established to look at this. With help from Community Enterprise, a feasibility study and business plan

had been drafted and circulated. Four ‘packages of work’ (covering different parts of the building) have been set out, depending on available finance among other factors.

A variety of points and concerns were expressed:

- The need for a clear vision of what we want to do with it.
- At present, there are many barriers for people coming in, both physical and psychological. Many people find traditional church buildings intimidating or completely unfamiliar.
- As part of the Presbytery plan, all churches must focus more on mission. Our Basis of Team Ministry sets out clearly that the 2nd minister will be focusing on developing mission at LW and it is important that we provide a space which helps to overcome these barriers.
- The number of volunteers required. At present, many members feel disconnected with what’s happening. There is a need to build human connections from which more volunteers will follow as members become more invested in what is being planned.
- Looking at the demographics, we need to make LW a focus to reach out to a large part of our parish.
- The team was thanked for all their hard work so far – it is always good to have a starting point for future discussions and thinking on large projects such as this.

We then had a talk from Kavi (a friend of Nikki’s) who is based at Central Church and works with refugees. Some points raised included:

- This involves a ‘ministry of presence’ which focuses on loving people well through being present and consistent in people’s lives.
- They help to make daily life easier. One example is an English conversation café to help with day-to-day English. This is done in a church setting but is open to people of all faiths. Discussions can be simple and practical but can lead to deeper conversations on beliefs, etc.

- It is important to find out who our neighbours are and be there for them.

Nikki thanked Kavi for her talk. Some responses included:

- We need to find ways to link with the community. Kavi said that people want to be asked and to ask questions. She suggested we should start with business owners. How do they market and link with the community. It was important to get to know people first.
- Many people are scared to come in. We need to go out there to encourage people in order for them to feel safe to be in our building.
- Carols on the Steps was one example of us being a presence. We should build on that idea.

One Thing

Nikki suggested we should have at least one thing that we should start working on before meeting again in roughly 6 months. It was agreed to aim to have the Open Doorway open weekly*.

Some other suggestions/points raised:

- Putting a leaflet together which all members can have. When they visit cafés and other businesses, they could use these to help engage with owners and pass on the leaflet. This might help those members who may be reticent about approaching people.
- A possible service focusing on Volunteering.
- If people can't volunteer themselves, we could encourage members to ask relatives, friends and neighbours to do so.

Nikki was thanked for organising the conference.

EDINBURGH FESTIVAL OF THE SACRED ARTS

Now in its 7th year, the Edinburgh Festival of the Sacred Arts is an integral part of the Fringe. Drawing on the rich Christian inheritance in music, visual art, architecture, drama, poetry and film, it brings churches, artists, performers and musicians together, enabling them to make a significant contribution to the cultural life of the City at Festival Time.

Using many of Edinburgh's finest churches as venues, this annual Festival aims to offer residents and visitors an unusual programme of recitals, exhibitions, tours, screenings and performances. They all draw on this great inheritance, and at the same time enable the Sacred Arts to make a significant contribution to the cultural life of Edinburgh during its summer festivals.

The 2026 Festival of the Sacred Arts will run from Sunday 16th August to Saturday 23rd August. An opening service in St Giles Cathedral is followed by a week of recitals, competition finals, poetry readings, drama and film screening, and an art exhibition – 'Bordering on the Sacred' – to which artists from all over Scotland have contributed.

'Exploring Sacred Space' is a series of guided tours, organised in conjunction with the National Churches Trust, which offers the opportunity to explore some of Edinburgh's less well known architectural glories. The week ends with the beautiful evening service of Orthodox Vespers.
